

Resources to find information

There are four (4) different resources we have found as great places to find information



An **online search** is one type of resource. You can use an online search, like Google or Bing, to find websites and publications on the internet.

Magazines and Journals

The **library** is another type of resource. You can go to the library or use online library databases. You can find information and research articles from published newspapers, magazines and journals.

Email

Talk with an expert



Personal communication is another type of resource. These are tools that allow you to talk with other people.



Social websites are the last type of resource. These are websites to help build relationships with others. You can also share news or information.


